Cabinet meeting Dec 10

The Cabinet agreed to foster more choirs and music groups across the district'
Existing Activity: such as numerous community choirs and music groups across the district, a thriving Brass Band scene and Festivals such as Gate to Southwell and Lost Village have been identified

The Cabinet agreed to:

- Map all current providers and identify gaps
- Collaborate through Music Forum, encourage the use of N&SDC's new event web pages to maximise promotion, and identify opportunities to showcase local talent
- Explore feasibility of growing / expanding community-led music in areas with few or no active groups

Significant Government funding is being provided to provide significant funds for Ollerton and Clipstone

Council Dec 17

The Liberal Democrats and Green Groups have withdrawn their support for the joint administration. There may, as a consequence, where the leading groups [Labour 10 and the Independents for Newark 6] no longer command a majority on the Council of 39 members, so there may be changes at the annual meeting in May.

A motion supporting farmers and agriculture was agreed.

A question querying the progress in meeting the objectives of the United Nations Sustainable Goals as a framework for the Council proposed by Keith Melton and agreed in October 2023, was tabled. Since that time Cllr Keith Melton was removed from the Cabinet and Cllr Emma Oldham has resigned, both having the portfolios for delivering these important matters

Planning Committee Jan 16

No local decisions were on the agenda, although the Committee is awaiting the implications of the Government's new Planning Framework. It is likely that the N&SDC will have to build well over 700 houses up from the previously agreed 340.

The implications on Southwell and the villages is unclear. However, as there is not a land supply of >5 years identified, developers will have a 'free hand' to apply for development - which may be objected to by the Council but will be very likely to be allowed on appeal to the Government's Inspectors

Cabinet Jan 21

The Cabinet will be considering the Government's recent announcement of changes to local government - which will mean the creation of very large unitary authorities with >500,000 residents. It will also be pressing ahead with the sale of an undeveloped and ecologically important land in Balderton for development.

Future First 2024

November 14th 2024 saw another very successful Future First Expo take place at the Lady Eastwood Centre at Newark Showground.

The Expo is aimed at schools around the District, catering specifically for year groups 10 and 11, considering their career choices.

Local schools make good use of the opportunity for students to participate in the event.

The Expo saw 67 exhibitors attend the event, they ranged from local employers; Barcode Warehouse, Boots, Ringrose Law, Newark College, Nottingham College, Nottingham University and Bakkavor, to exhibitors from Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, National Horseracing College and HM prison and probation service.

Southwell Minster School again, had the highest attendance, sending 245 students from years 10 and 11. Transport to and from the Showground is at no cost to schools, it is paid for by the exhibitors. Feedback has again been very positive, a date for a Future First 2025 Expo is already being planned by the economic development team at NSDC.

Kiddey Stones

A decision was taken at December's NSDC's Cabinet meeting to uphold an earlier decision to display the Kiddey Stones outside Castle House.

Cabinet considered the public consultation which enabled residents and stakeholders to have their views heard.

The Kiddey Stone tablets have been stored at Newark cemetery on London Road for approaching 40 years. They comprise of 12 pieces of stone forming 4 panels. The individual tablets measure 2m in height and 1m in width.

The carved sandstone tablets were originally commissioned and installed at Wilford Power Station. When the power station closed the tablets were given to Newark Town Council.

The public consultation sparked a lot of interest and had a huge response with in excess of 800 participants. Looking at the responses 57.32% participants were unsupportive of the proposals. The main reason cited was money should be better spent and, a waste of public money.

Some respondents who were supportive of the proposal stated that the intended location was not suitable, and would attract little interest and attention.

Only 19% of responses were supportive of both the project and location.

NSDC Cabinet, with 1 against (Cllr Jack Kallas, leader of the opposition) and 1 abstention, voted to disregard the public consultation and vote in favour of the project going ahead,

The Kiddey Stones will remain the property of Newark Town Council. The revised cost to display the stones has now risen to £87,430.
