

Report for Halam News: Halam Parish Council Meeting 7.30pm on Thursday 11th September 2025 held at Halam Village Hall

Apologies: Chris Bevans **Absent**: Charlie Wright

Community Protection Officer: Unfortunately Mr Connor Field, Community Protection Officer did not attend the meeting. He will be invited to a future meeting.

Matters Arising from Previous Meeting

A. first aid training – Financial Officer to liaise with Halam W.I. to be involved with their CRP training sessions. Need to check that this will be open to all parishioners.

B. planning at St Michael's Close – nothing further to report

Open Meeting

- 1. A parishioner asked if the schedule for the mobile library visits to the village could be publicised Kate Taylor, Village News editor will be contacted about this.
- 2. The question of the ease of use of the defibrillators was brought up. It was proposed to circulate a leaflet in the village explaining how the two Halam defibrillators work. Financial Officer will look into the information available on the training website.

Update from County Councillor

County Cllr Bruce Laughton outlined the options being considered to for reorganisation of Nottinghamshire and Nottingham City council structures, to form two separate unitary councils. District councils will cease to exist and be replaced by an overall County Unitary Authority. He explained that the changes could have a significant effect on council tax.

Finance

Agreed to pay:

1. churchyard bench plaque, 2. cost of VE flyers, 3. bill for the allotment clearance

It was minuted that the Clerk's back-pay could be paid to another named account. Resolved to make payment – 4 for: 1 against.

Village Hall

The maintenance schedule was circulated and agreed.

The gutters on the hall may need clearing - Clerk to sort.

The previous cleaner did not have liability insurance, so a new cleaner is being sought.

Allotments

Further to last month's discussion about old tyres being used as planters, the allotment tenancy agreements will be amended to cover tyre removal being a condition on termination of any tenancy. To be implemented next April.

Andrew Paris to check of progress of the title claim.

Roads & Hedges

- 1. A letter has been received from the school pointing out the number of cars still parked on School Lane during school holidays, indicating that the parking problems aren't solely caused by the school. Clerk to speak to Halam Salon and to see if the builders working on a property on School Lane as this is also causing parking issues.
- 2. The trees overhanging Halam Hill still require cutting back County Council Highways have said that this issue "will be addressed and dealt with in due course".
- 3. Footpath no: 7 bridge over the Beck to St Helen's Lane is scheduled to be fixed by the end of September.

A Harvest Celebration Afternoon Tea - Sunday 12th October from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the village hall

The format and catering was discussed. A budget of £375 was agreed to spend on sandwiches and sausage rolls

District Cllrs Karen Roberts and Peter Harris Report for September 2025



Details are on the Council's website - see The Council - Calendar of Meetings for links to each of the papers and reports. There have been few meetings since opur last report in November

The news that two Newark Councillors elected as Newark Independents but who subsequently left their group, one becoming a Green and the other an 'independent' Independent , will mean a further two by-elections. These follow Reform's County Council member for Newark's resignation, two months ago, and Reform's loss there. The District Council is still with no overall control but all the powerful Cabinet posts - and Leader, who have significant decision making authority are still in Labour and Newark Independents' control. August is a month with no meetings apart from Planning Committee. The next Council meeting will be held in October.

Southwell's footfall data from the N&SDC show a continuance of the number of people visiting Southwell, despite the school holidays that undoubtedly has an effect on numbers. Friday 4th July was the highest footfall day of the month (14% above the average figure) with nearly 2500 people in the town. This could be linked to the Gate to Southwell festival that took place in Kirklington.

The Planning Committee is continuing to deal with solar panel and battery farms around the area. This is no doubt linked to the grid that serves the Staythorpe power station, but has a significant effect on the landscape, and removes fairly productive land from food supply. This is of concern - but these project are now dealt with the Central Government rather than locally as national Infrastructure projects, so little heed is taken of the local voice by this centralised approach.

Crime in the area was up by 3% last month but the good news is that anti-social behaviour is reduced with just 3 incidents in Southwell and the villages. The sager Neighbourhood, chaired by Peter, continues to monitor crime here and gets regular, and sometimes confidential reports from the Police. There have been no reports of theft from shops in the town, but the Police are requesting that concerns be sent to them as they can only respond when data is received.

Unfortunately there is continuing to be an under performance in the assessment of the Council's housing stock including safety inspections and Karen is following these up at the Policy and Performance Committee, despite these being signed off at the Cabinet.

Following Peter's question relating to the allocation of Government funds to support bus service infrastructure in Southwell and the villages,. there has not been a full response from the Leader of the Council - who has a key role on the East Midland's Mayor's scrutiny. The Leader's response was that Peter had not asked a question about buses before - forgetting, perhaps, that until a few months ago responsibility for public transport was never a District Council function! At the next meeting Peter will be asking about how the Mayor is challenging the Government's decision to stop electrifying the Midlands Main Line from Nottingham to London after major expenditure on the bridges to allow it has already taken place. Electrification will significantly improve choice for residents here - and its very recent decision to 'suspend' the improvements of the line to Birmingham in the Midlands Hub that is now entirely focussed on west of Birmingham.

Newark Town Centre Masterplan

The Newark Town Centre Masterplan, a long-term vision to revitalise the town centre, has now reached the final proposals stage.

These plans will be on display at the Buttermarket, Newark for four weeks.

The plans have been shaped by over 1,550 survey responses, a considerable public engagement exercise.

The Masterplan has focused on; tackling vacant shops, with new homes and mixed-use developments, improving pedestrian links and riverside leisure spaces and enhancing event infrastructure and community facilities.

To identify what residents love most about our area, NSDC are working with various professional teams, including Historic England and architects, to understand what is wanted and needed to help shape Newark's future.

The Masterplan is a long term plan which sets out where and how physical building, spaces and activities in the town centre can and should change, whilst protecting the listed buildings and character.

The options for the Town Centre are being presented to the public so any further thoughts can be considered before the final version of the Masterplan is prepared.

8th September to 3rd October, Monday to Saturday 9am to 4pm.

Local Government Reform

All Nottinghamshire Councils continue to collaborate as they work towards reorganisation of the local government system. Under the chosen option NSDC identified option 1e as its preferred approach and is now working on submitting this proposal. Under this option, two new unitary councils would serve the whole of Nottingham and Nottinghamshire.

One unitary council that includes Nottingham City, Broxtowe and Rushcliffe, plus one unitary council that includes Newark and Sherwood, Ashfield, Bassetlaw, Gedling and Mansfield. The criteria and work streams are:

- 1. Single tier of government
- 2. Improve efficiencies and capacity
- 3. High quality and sustainable public services
- 4. Meeting local needs and informed by local views, stronger community engagement and opportunity for for neighbourhood empowerment
- 5. Structures that support devolution arrangements

NSDC is now working towards submitting a final business case to the Government which needs to meet the deadline of 28th November 2025. A final decision from Government is not expected until spring/summer 2026, elections are scheduled for May 2027.

A challenge for some NSDC staff is balancing work stream participation with their regular duties as LGR preparation touches almost every service the district council offers.

Simpler Recycling

Simpler Recycling means that items such as foil, food and drink cartons, plastic tubs, pots and trays will all be acceptable in the silver bin mixed with the existing range of materials collected.

Simpler recycling will end the postcode lottery of bin collection as residents will be able to recycle the same materials at home, work or school across the country.

Simpler recycling does not include the requirement to provide a garden waste service, however it is still the intention of NSDC to continue collecting this separately as there is a significant benefit to composting this waste, it also generates over £800,000 revenue for the Council.

This new recycling policy will be rolled out in phases over a period of two and a half years.
