Matters Arising from Previous Meeting

a. .gov.uk emails for the parish council and councillors – $\pounds 100$ government funding available. Chris Bevans and Financial Officer to complete the process.

b. Damaged fingerpost at crossroads – a Section 115 Notice will be required for the parish to take ownership and replace the current sign post. Waiting for Notts County Council to advise what their replacement proposal would be. Financial Officer researching what types of signs are available commercially.

- c. Overhanging hedge, School Lane, alongside the golf course has now been completed.
- d. Banking Unity Bank is the favoured solution; the Financial Officer to check signatory process (requirement for two parish councillors to sign). Signature mandate and I.D. checks will be needed.

Update from District Councillors

A 'new bridge' across the Trent is planned to facilitate inter town cycling to Newark - rather than using the narrow and potentially dangerous Kelham Bridge.

Village Hall

- 1. Hall floor a quote has been received to strip, sand and reseal the floor. It was agreed that the floor should be given a good cleaning before any final decision is made.
- 2. Village Hall Wall lowering the wall has proved not to be an option. Clerk to obtain quotes for (i) rebuilding the less secure section of the wall, and (ii) a gate to secure the side passage of the village hall.
- 3. Bus shelter and area round the phone box and crossroad bench Catherine Blackburn volunteered to tidy up these areas.

Cabinet meeting Dec 10

The Cabinet agreed to foster more choirs and music groups across the district'
Existing Activity: such as numerous community choirs and music groups across the district, a thriving Brass Band scene and Festivals such as Gate to Southwell and Lost Village have been identified

The Cabinet agreed to:

- Map all current providers and identify gaps
- Collaborate through Music Forum, encourage the use of N&SDC's new event web pages to maximise promotion, and identify opportunities to showcase local talent
- Explore feasibility of growing / expanding community-led music in areas with few or no active groups

Significant Government funding is being provided to provide significant funds for Ollerton and Clipstone

Council Dec 17

The Liberal Democrats and Green Groups have withdrawn their support for the joint administration. There may, as a consequence, where the leading groups [Labour 10 and the Independents for Newark 6] no longer command a majority on the Council of 39 members, so there may be changes at the annual meeting in May.

A motion supporting farmers and agriculture was agreed.

A question querying the progress in meeting the objectives of the United Nations Sustainable Goals as a framework for the Council proposed by Keith Melton and agreed in October 2023, was tabled. Since that time Cllr Keith Melton was removed from the Cabinet and Cllr Emma Oldham has resigned, both having the portfolios for delivering these important matters

Planning Committee Jan 16

No local decisions were on the agenda, although the Committee is awaiting the implications of the Government's new Planning Framework. It is likely that the N&SDC will have to build well over 700 houses up from the previously agreed 340.

The implications on Southwell and the villages is unclear. However, as there is not a land supply of >5 years identified, developers will have a 'free hand' to apply for development - which may be objected to by the Council but will be very likely to be allowed on appeal to the Government's Inspectors

Cabinet Jan 21

The Cabinet will be considering the Government's recent announcement of changes to local government - which will mean the creation of very large unitary authorities with >500,000 residents. It will also be pressing ahead with the sale of an undeveloped and ecologically important land in Balderton for development.

Future First 2024

November 14th 2024 saw another very successful Future First Expo take place at the Lady Eastwood Centre at Newark Showground.

The Expo is aimed at schools around the District, catering specifically for year groups 10 and 11, considering their career choices.

Local schools make good use of the opportunity for students to participate in the event.

The Expo saw 67 exhibitors attend the event, they ranged from local employers; Barcode Warehouse, Boots, Ringrose Law, Newark College, Nottingham College, Nottingham University and Bakkavor, to exhibitors from Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, National Horseracing College and HM prison and probation service. Southwell Minster School again, had the highest attendance, sending 245 students from years 10 and 11. Transport to and from the Showground is at no cost to schools, it is paid for by the exhibitors. Feedback has again been very positive, a date for a Future First 2025 Expo is already being planned by the economic

Kiddey Stones

development team at NSDC.

A decision was taken at December's NSDC's Cabinet meeting to uphold an earlier decision to display the Kiddey Stones outside Castle House.

Cabinet considered the public consultation which enabled residents and stakeholders to have their views heard.

The Kiddey Stone tablets have been stored at Newark cemetery on London Road for approaching 40 years. They comprise of 12 pieces of stone forming 4 panels. The individual tablets measure 2m in height and 1m in width.

The carved sandstone tablets were originally commissioned and installed at Wilford Power Station. When the power station closed the tablets were given to Newark Town Council.

The public consultation sparked a lot of interest and had a huge response with in excess of 800 participants. Looking at the responses 57.32% participants were unsupportive of the proposals. The main reason cited was money should be better spent and, a waste of public money.

Some respondents who were supportive of the proposal stated that the intended location was not suitable, and would attract little interest and attention.

Only 19% of responses were supportive of both the project and location.

NSDC Cabinet, with 1 against (Cllr Jack Kallas, leader of the opposition) and 1 abstention, voted to disregard the public consultation and vote in favour of the project going ahead,

The Kiddey Stones will remain the property of Newark Town Council. The revised cost to display the stones has now risen to £87,430.

Flood Management Update: January 2025 Meeting Summary

A previously postponed meeting from November 2024 was held at the end of January between the Halam Flood Action Group (FLAG) committee and the Nottinghamshire County Council (NCC) Flood Officer. During the meeting, the Natural Flood Management (NFM) model was presented, highlighting key areas where measures could be implemented to slow water flow into Halam. Discussions with landowners have already begun to explore potential locations for mitigation efforts.

The initial NFM feasibility study is expected to be completed by March/April 2025. Once there is greater clarity on costs and design, a follow-up meeting will be scheduled with the Flood Officer to discuss the next steps. The scale of NFM interventions will be influenced by an economic appraisal, which considers the number of properties affected by flooding. Increased investment is more likely if a greater number of properties are impacted. Therefore, it is crucial that any instances of flooding in the village are reported to NCC or through Halam FLAG. All reports will be handled confidentially and will only be used to shape future mitigation plans insurance companies will not be notified.

FLAG was also informed that flood warden training will commence once 50 volunteers have been recruited across the region.

Additionally, the NCC Flood Officer intends to engage directly with Severn Trent Water following concerns raised by FLAG regarding plans to divert additional water into local watercourses from the pumping station. NCC will also follow up with the Internal Drainage Board (IDB) regarding recent survey work conducted in the area. Further updates will be shared as more information becomes available.

Matters Arising from Previous Meeting

Allotments

A group of allotment holders were present at the meeting; they were informed that a grant application to Severn Trent Water has been unsuccessful. The aim of the grant money was to be used to create parking inside the allotment boundary. However, the application was rejected as a result of the money benefiting minimal people in the village. Agreed that the County Councill will be contacted to understand whether some lane verges can be cut back to create parking along Gray Lane. Hedge cutting on the allotment side will also take place following bird nesting season. Further clearing of the allotments will be looked at, and the availability of plots can be publicised once cleared to try and encourage more allotment tenants.

Title – the documents are with the specialist solicitor to apply for Absolute Title. The solicitor now requires some further details from the parish council Chair and Clerk. Mr Croston will send the Clerk a list of the information needed.

Roads & Hedges

A complaint has been received about some of the hedges in the village overhanging the pavement. The Clerk will speak to the householders. Andrew Paris reported that some of the kerb gulleys on Radley Road are clogged with mud. To be raise with County Cllr Bruce Laughton for action.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT FEBRUARY 2025 CLLR PENNY RAINBOW

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

The Minister of State for Local Government and English Devolution has written/emailed NSDC asking for comment on 'our' vision for the proposed reorganisation of local government. The same has also been sent to Ashfield, Bassetlaw, Broxtowe, Gedling, Mansfield, Rushcliffe as well as Nottingham City Council and Nottingham County Council.

While the expectation is for local authorities to work together and arrive at a consensus, individual Councils can submit their own proposal jointly with any of the Councils invited to respond. All proposals that are submitted must have regard to the laid out criteria and the timeline for this process. The criteria includes 'sensible' geographical and economic areas, they must be the right size in order to achieve; efficiencies (a minimum 5000,000 population); secure 'crucial' services such as social care, Children's services and homelessness; and demonstrate plans to make sure that communities are engaged.

Interim plans are to be submitted on or before 21st March 2025.

The full and final proposal is to be submitted on or before 28th November 2025.

Once a unitary proposal has been agreed, the Government will progress elections to new 'shadow' unitary councils as soon as possible.

NSDC councillors and Town clerks are due to attend a further briefing on Wednesday of this week.

POLICY & PERFORMANCE IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

The PPI Committee is due to hear a review of the Bassetlaw and Newark Community Safety Partnership at its meeting this week. The existence of a Community Safety Partnership is a statutory requirement, a number of authorities make up the partnership; The District Council, The County Council, The Chief Officer of Police, The Fire and Rescue Authority, The Integrated Care Boards.

The above authorities meet on a quarterly basis. Performance reports are produced each month on all crime and antisocial behaviour. The performance for crime for 24/25 when compared to the previous year shows that Newark and Sherwood experienced a 1.6% increase in all crime compared to a 4.5% reduction in the county. However, Newark and Sherwood experienced an 14.5% reduction in anti-social behaviour compared to an 8.3% reduction in the county.

The safety partnership are looking at five key themes for the coming year;

- Serious violence, violence against women and girls, and domestic abuse
- Anti-social Behaviour
- Vulnerability and Contextual Safeguarding
- Community Cohesion
- Neighbourhood Crime

The CCTV control room currently based at Police headquarters in Sherwood is due to move to an NSDC location within the Beacon building on Beacon Hill, Newark. This was a cabinet decision and a two year notice period was triggered last year.

A camera replacement programme has been agreed and to date 14 cameras have been installed, 13 cameras in Newark and 1 at Southwell Leisure Centre.

NEWARK CASTLE - GATEHOUSE PROJECT

In March 2017 NSDC was successfully awarded a Heritage Lottery Fund to carry out a feasibility study to enhance the Castle Gatehouse project. The Gatehouse is, in the opinion of Historic England, 'the most complete example of a Romanesque gatehouse in England'.





A master plan has now been developed;

Work is due to start late March early April for a 12 month project.

A roof will be put on the gatehouse.

The gardens will remain open, albeit limited, to the public during works.

A lift will be incorporated to the first floor for greater accessibility.

A welcome area and larger room will be available for functions.

An extensive education programme will be on offer for school groups.

16 trees have been felled, 2 were grade A.

Replanting scheme included in plans.

Entry price for NSDC residents will be at half the price that tourists will be expected to pay.

Anyone finding issues with pavements or kerbs should report this to the County Council www.nottinghamshire.gov.uk/transport/roads/report-a-road-or-pavement-problem
- 2. The kerb gulleys along Radley Road are still blocked Clerk to report to County Council.
- 3. A complaint had been received that many hedges in the village are overhanging the pavements making it very hard to walk on the pavements with a pushchair or pram. Householders are reminded that it is their responsibility to make sure that their hedges do not restrict the footpaths and pavements.

Update from District Councillor

District Cllr Penny Rainbow reported that the district's council tax will rise 1.94% this year.

Cllr Rainbow also outlined the plans to create a Nottinghamshire Unitary Body, under which district councils, including Newark & Sherwood, will be scrapped. The final details are still being worked on.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT MARCH 2025 CLLR PENNY RAINBOW

FULL COUNCIL MEETING 6th MARCH 2025

The last full Council meeting at NSDC was given over to discuss and set the Council Budget for 2025/2026, The Council is required by the Local Government Finance Act of 1992 to set a Council Tax for the coming financial year.

The Council Tax Base along with the Council Tax Base for all Parish Councils had been calculated and contained within the agenda. These figures are then added to those received from Notts County Council, the Nottinghamshire Combined Fire Authority and the Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner.

The current administration at NSDC, made up of the Labour Group and the Independents for Newark Group, were proposing to increase council tax by the maximum allowable of 2.99%. The leader of the Conservative Group, Cllr Jack Kallas, proposed an amendment to the budget; The amendment - 'Council reduces the proposed increase in council tax from the maximum increase allowable of 2.99%, to a lower and more conservative increase of 1.94%.'

The amendment was successful. The first time in 14 years that an amendment to the budget has been approved.

NEWARK and SHERWOOD GIFT CARD

A new initiative has been introduced by the NSDC Economic Growth Team. NSDC has previously committed, as part of its response to the cost of living crisis, a Gift Card solution to support traders in Newark, Balderton, Edwinstowe, Ollerton and Southwell. With high street footfall in decline the gift card programme is being trialed to hopefully provide opportunities to divert online spend back into the local economy.

We are told the programme is up and running in Lincoln, and is reasonably successful. The launch of the NSDC Town and City gift card, a prepaid Mastercard, went live on Monday 10th March.

Both national brands and independent businesses with card machines or digital readers can easily sign up to accept the gift card. The scheme is also available for hospitality, accommodation and health and beauty providers. The card encourages consumers to shop local. Gift cards can be ordered online via NSDC website. Cards are spent in store, encouraging a visit to the town centre. The card can be tapped or swiped or stored on a phone.

MAJOR NEW PLANTING SCHEME

A report went to Cabinet to agree an investment of £300,000 to create a new capital scheme in relation to the contribution to Nottinghamshire County Council for two major, tree planting schemes in the district. NSDC have already planted or given away 6324 trees.

Nottingham County Council, through its trees for climate project, have purchased 2 large parcels of land within the Newark and Sherwood District. The first site is in Little Carlton, around 18ha and is former arable land. The second site is Thorney Abbey Farm, near Southwell. This site is 48ha, it lends itself to a range of habitat restoration and is capable of accommodating 87,000 trees.

Council Tax

Decided on an increase of 1.94%, well below the rate of inflation. At a time when many Councils are making cuts in services, NSCD in a privileged position of continuing to invest, but only because we're continuing to identify efficiencies and generate additional income. Investment plans include:

£15m towards regeneration of Yorke Drive, £300,000 towards Lowdham flood alleviation scheme, £8.5m towards creation of a new industrial park in Clipstone, £669,000 to improve Brunel Drive depot, facilitating future new recycling schemes, £2m towards new sports pitches, £100,000 to strengthen staff training and development

Update on Local Government Re-organisation

At a meeting of all Nottingham and Nottinghamshire Leaders and Chief Executives, it was agreed to submit to Government three options, all of which involve replacing our current 9 Councils with 2 unitary Councils. Before being submitted, these options will be considered at an Extraordinary Meeting of our Full Council on 19 March. The three options are: Nottingham City, Broxtowe and Gedling; Ashfield, Bassetlaw, Mansfield, Newark and Sherwood and Rushcliffe Nottingham City, Broxtowe and Rushcliffe; Ashfield, Bassetlaw, Gedling, Mansfield and Newark and Sherwood Nottingham City; Nottinghamshire County (single County unitary)

PPI

NSDC received notification that it will receive £1.427m in Extended Producer Responsibility payment from DEFRA for 2025/26, in relation to estimated net efficient costs associated with collection of household packaging waste from kerbside and communal collections. It is expected this funding will be used for the food waste collection service that is due to be rolled out across Nottinghamshire from October 2027. The Council also received (during 2024/25) £983,377 from DEFRA in respect of the capital funding to purchase the refuse freighters and other equipment necessary to roll out the food waste service. Latest assumptions are that the capital cost would equate to £1.570m being £0.586m short from the capital grant.

Industrial Units at Crew Lane, Southwell

Corporate Property project: This project has been reviewed by officers and it is currently not viable from a financial perspective, & hence would not generate a return to the Council. Therefore, this project has been ceased for the time being.

Tree on Halloughton Road

A tree was removed from NCC land (not by NCC). The provision of a Tree Preservation Order (TPO), while it is indeed possible, NSCD generally consider NCC to be good custodians of the land and trees. Any works to remove trees would typically be undertaken only when absolutely necessary. Investigations by NCC are ongoing.

Simpler Recycling: responding to new food waste legislation for businesses

In 2018, the former government laid its plans to revolutionise the way local authorities collected and managed recyclable waste through the National Resources and Waste Strategy. This is now being progressed under the title of 'Simpler Recycling'. One of the key parts of this strategy is the move to create consistent waste and recycling collections across the UK and to mandate local authorities to collect food waste on a weekly schedule. For Newark and Sherwood, this will mean items such as foil, food and beverage cartons and plastic tubs, pots and trays will be acceptable in the silver bin alongside the existing range of materials. Food waste collections will be taking place from October 2027 and plans are underway to determine round sizes, vehicle numbers, disposal points, bin colours, staff requirements and depot requirements. Discussions with NCC and Veolia are still taking place to determine the viability of varying the environmental permit to allow food waste to be taken to Veolia's transfer station on Brunel Drive. If this can be arranged, it will not be in place until October 2027 and is not an option for commercial food waste disposal.

<u>April 2025:</u> Trade waste customers with 10 or more employees will be obliged to separate food waste and recyclable materials – and arrange for this to be collected separately. Schools and educational establishments are also required to separate and arrange collections for an extended range of recyclable materials.

<u>April 2026:</u> All households will be able to recycle an extended range of materials in their silver bin. As this service is legally mandated NSDC have made provision in the Capital Programme Budget 2025/6 to 2028/9 for the purchase of a food waste vehicle and funding for one additional driver.

Community Grant Scheme

The current criteria for the Community Grant Scheme was agreed by Cabinet in October 2023, it has now been amended to allow smaller parish and town councils to apply for funding. It is proposed to re-open the community Grant Scheme to those smaller parishes and parish meetings with less than 100 homes within the parish in recognition of their limited ability to raise a precept annually due to the low number of properties within the parish. This means 22 additional parishes will now be eligible, to include in our area: Halloughton, Winkburn, Hockerton

In addition to changes with the grant criteria, this report requests approval to carry over unclaimed grant from previous years into the grant scheme for 2025-26. These grants have gone unclaimed as the projects for which they were allocated have not gone ahead and include:

Community grant scheme 2022/2023: Southwell Football Club awarded £2,500

Community grant scheme 2023/2024: Reach awarded £10,000

Total value: £29,000 of unclaimed grants to all small parishes.

A further £102,250 was allocated to the Community Grant Scheme for 2024/25 with carry forwards from the previous year bringing the total budget to £227,128. Carry forwards in each year are generally in response to grant being allocated in year to a group but not yet claimed.

In the 2025/26 budget there is £104,300 and a management carry forward will be requested for any unspent funds at the end of the 2024/25 financial year. As before, the majority of these funds will be committed to projects, with the £29,000 identified as uncommitted.


May 29th is Ascension Day – Jesus' coronation when He ascended into heaven. There is a service at St. Giles at 10.00a.m.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT APRIL 2025 CLLR PENNY RAINBOW (Ward member for Southwell)



LOCAL GOVERNMENT RE-ORGANISATION

NSDC held an extraordinary full Council meeting on Wednesday 19th March, to discuss the preferred option/options to go forward to Government by way of an Interim Plan. All Council's in Nottingham and Nottinghamshire were consulted and asked to propose a plan to reduce the number of Councils from 9 to 2. The Interim Plan sets out a series of options to this effect.

First option; One new unitary council combining Nottingham City, Broxtow and Gedling with the other combining Ashfield, Bassetlaw, Mansfield, Newark and Sherwood and Rushcliffe.

Second option; One new unitary council combining Nottingham City, Broxtowe and Rushcliffe with the other combining Ashfield, Bassetlaw, Mansfield, Newark and Sherwood and Gedling.

Third option; Nottingham City Council remaining as a unitary council on its current boundary with a new unitary Council being created for the rest of Nottinghamshire by combining Nottinghamshire County Council, Ashfield, Bassetlaw, Broxtowe, Gedling, Mansfield, Newark and Sherwood and Rushcliffe.

The above options were reported to the Government Minister. An acknowledgment has been received and NSDC, will formally hear back, with a final decision being expected around November/December this year.

The new system will be implemented after April 2028.

COMMUNITY PLAN REFRESH - 2025-2027

The Community Plan covers the period up until May 2027 and sets out what the Council intends to achieve and how it will go about doing that.

The NSDC Cabinet meeting held on Tuesday 1st April saw an updated Community Plan on the agenda, to be considered for approval. The slimmed down plan see's a reduction of workload as suggested by the Corporate Peer Challenge Report, which addresses concerns over capacity and the implications it has on staff time and morale. 'Objectives' in the plan have changed to 'Ambitions'

There are 7 ambitions in the community plan all relating to Cabinet members portfolios. A good number of the ambitions are part way through. The Community Plan can be accessed on the Council's website.

Parkinson's UK walk tops £5,000 target.

A Farnsfield Walk For Parkinson's was held on Saturday April 26th and raised the magnificent amount of £5,100 for the charity Parkinson's UK. This is the fifth year that the walk has taken place, starting in 2021 and over this period in excess of £23,000 has been accumulated.

The circular walk took place over an 8.3 mile route commencing at The Plough, Farnsfield. Refreshment stops were held at Norwood Park Golf Club where a light BBQ meal was provided followed by stops at The Waggon in Halam and The Old Reindeer at Edingley before returning to The Plough.



125 walkers, many with their dogs, took part. As well as the funds raised by the walkers who pre-registered, collections were made on the day and donations were received through the JustGiving website page. The amount raised was also boosted by a very successful raffle with 22 prizes donated by local businesses to which we are extremely grateful to. Thanks also to the Farnsfield Trust for their support for this community based event, Mark Tomlinson who donated £500 (match funded by Lloyds Bank) and Sarah Vardy from PIB Community Trust who donated £600.

John Butler a local resident of Farnsfield who is living with Parkinson's planned the walk assisted by a small team and has been absolutely delighted with the generosity of everyone involved. John said, "Special thanks must go out to Bob Reeves and his team at The Plough, all the volunteers, Katie Thomas from Parkinson's UK and to William Brown from The Rotary Club of Southwell and his volunteer stewards for. Also to the pubs and the golf club for their hospitality."

The event was held to encourage people to get together with their friends, family or colleagues to enjoy an outdoor activity while raising vital funds to support people living with the condition. This year we were also joined by Adrian and Judith Wriggley from Teeside who are major fundraisers for Parkinson's UK in the North East.

Parkinson's is the fastest growing neurological condition in the world, and currently there is no cure. It affects around 145,000 people in the UK and every hour two more people are diagnosed. There are over 40 symptoms, from tremor and pain to anxiety.

We hope to see all this years' walkers return and hopefully some new participants in April 2026 when we will continue the fight against this debilitating disease. **Bruce McDowall**

District Cllrs Karen Roberts and Peter Harris Report for May 2025



Details are on the Council's website - see The Council - Calendar of Meetings for links to each of the papers and reports. There have been few meetings since our last report in April. Cabinet decisions - often taken by just one Portfolio holder - are also on the website.

Leisure Centre Trustees: Councillors will have seen the recent agreed Press Release form the Trustees and N&SDC. The date for the transfer of the release has passed but the N&SDC Councillors have been given no public [but one secret communication] information of the process - or received any indication of a Cabinet Member decision of the matter.

The Cabinet have agreed to spend £500,00 on the town centre in Ollerton and £200,000 in Clipstone.

The small amount of money agreed by the Council to agree on reducing plastics going into the seas and other issues relating to the ocean have been removed

Audit and Governance Committees Wed April 16 and May 7: The Committee , under the previous Chair of Peter Harris, asked to change its meetings to Mondays as a number of Councillors could not attend. The new Chair has reinstated Wednesday as the meeting date. As a consequence the meetings were not well attended, albeit just quorate.

The Annual Council meeting is on Tues May 13: The agenda has not been published but Peter Harris has asked a question on how the equivalent of £136,950 for capital expenditure in Southwell on the Bus Improvement Grantallocated by the Mayor of the East Midlands Combined Authority - will be monitored and challenged by the Leader of the District Council.

We are also asking a question of the impact of the overnight cessation of the Sustainable Farming programme, in March, will have on the local environment. The SFI supports farms to implement environmental improvements such as herbal lays and betle banks on their land. Applications for new SFI programmes was withdrawn without notice - although farmers in the process of application were told they would have six weeks to submit their applications. There are a number of farms locally that were looking to submit their bids.

Planning

The plans for houses on the Rolleston village hall's adjacent grassland, had been refused by the N&SDCs Planning Committee. We were very surprised to find that N&SDC had appealed that decision. The Certificate for Lawful Development acquired by the Village Hall relating to that land provided a full stop to such development. This appeal must have had a proper process initiating it involving a portfolio holder as well as officers of NSDC in making it. Keith Melton has asked where this decision was minuted and, thus far, he has not received an answer to that query and is pursuing this issue with a written question to full council

Various

NSDC have temporarily closured the housing register from Tuesday 22 April until August 2025, to enable all applicants to register under the revised Allocation Scheme following go live of the new housing management system (NEC) in May 2025.

We are currently contacting those on the register to keep them informed and will be regularly updating them as we work through the data transference from the old system to the new, and to request applicants re-register onto the new system before the register goes live again in August.

When the new system is live we will have a service that:

- is user friendly with improved self-service functionality giving applicants more control
- has improved security for personal information
- · can work well on various devices.

The National Employers have made an offer of a 3.2% pay increase for Council employees from 1 April 2025. Unions will now be discussing the offer and deciding on next steps.

Developed the DRAFT Sustainable Economic Growth Strategy 2026-2031

The next steps after 30 May 2025 will be:

- To consult with key partners and stakeholders including the East Midlands Combined Authority, Nottinghamshire County Council, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Federation of Small Business.
- To bring a completed Strategy to Cabinet in Autumn 2025.
