As the Chair was not present Mrs Denyer declared the meeting open.


As the meeting was not quorate, no business was transacted.



## District Cllrs Karen Roberts and Peter Harris Report for October 2025

#### Policy & Performance Improvement Committee - 6 October

In November 2020, the Government published the charter for social housing residents which set out ways to improve things for people living in social housing. The Regulator for Social Housing (RSH) brought in a range of tenant perception satisfaction measures so tenants could see how landlords are performing and identify which landlords might need to improve. NSDC carried out its second annual survey - out of 12 questions posed, satisfaction in 4 declined, while 7 got better and overall satisfaction was the same at 77.2%. More work has been done to the housing stock (more money spent), but expectations are now higher – but more work is planned and extra resources committed.

NSDC has delivered 1090 affordable dwelling since 2013. A new district wide survey will be commissioned in the Autumn of 2025 with an estimated completion date of December 2025/January 2026. New-build Council owned homes totalling 352 properties. Phase five (the final phase) of the 5 Year HRA Programme was completed in the summer of 2024. The Cabinet meeting in September 2023, approved additional development and is extending its programme to include a further fifty units utilizing S106 Contributions, Right to Buy Receipts and any external funding. The Council owns 5567 dwellings (2025), with eight sold through the Right to Buy in 2023/24. There are currently 2949 applicants on the Council's housing register (2025), a decrease of 1465 on the previous year (moved to a new system and closure for applications which probably reflects on the numbers – now open for new applications). April 2024 and March 2025, 129 additional affordable homes have been built across the district (located in Balderton, Bilsthorpe, Rainworth, Walesby, Ollerton, Edwinstowe, Southwell and Hawtonville. (Assessments of 243 new affordable home needed).

#### Nottingham & Nottinghamshire Draft Local Nature Recovery Strategy Consultation.

Main concerns are:

- Overlap with sites allocated for development in the relevant local plan and overlap with existing built development (mainly in association with watercourses);
- Grassland (insufficient grassland areas);
- Wet Woodland Layer (potential measures inappropriate);
- Relationship with Biodiversity Net Gain (correlation of habitat terminology); and
- Section 2.3 of the draft Statement of Biodiversity Priorities (misleading paragraph).

Cabinet approval with no objections.

The recommendation if for the strategy to be endorsed by NSDC.

UK Shared Prosperity Fund and Rural England Prosperity Fund (2022 to 2026). NSDC received £5,794,997 in grant funding: 314 businesses supported, 91 jobs safeguarded, 24 jobs created, 28 businesses decarbonisation plans developed, 63 businesses with improved sustainability, 85 businesses with improved productivity, 6 new businesses created, 266 residents gained life skills ï 42 economically inactive residents newly in job searching, 162 residents completing training courses or obtaining qualifications, 653 residents volunteering, 3k+ trees planted, 120 community events delivered, 15 community facilities created or improved. Site improvements - Capital grant to Southwell Brincliffe Hockey Club (REPF 25-26). 3 years plus 1 - Final year ends in end of March 2026.

Portfolio Holder for Climate and the Environment Simon Forde attended and updated committee members. He will suggest Southwell be considered as one of 5 annual 'green gateway' towns and reports an increase in budget of £10k for education next year.

#### **Various**

Anti-Social Behaviour's Night of action cancelled on Friday 3 October due to high wind, another will be scheduled soon.

Plastic bags are our biggest contaminant in dry mixed recycling bins throughout our district. They are not currently recycled with kerbside collections as they require a different recycling process. If you use plastic bags to collect mixed recycling in at home or at work, please be sure to empty the contents into the recycling bins. Items should always be empty, clean, dry, and loose! If you are ever in doubt, leave it out! Where possible, REuse bags for shopping or to REline your kitchen recycling bin. Recycle them at flexible plastic collection points in many supermarkets.

#### **GREEN GATEWAYS**

NSDC has recently undertaken a pilot scheme in launching a new green initiative before proceeding with a full scale rollout of green gateways. This green initiative is designed to fit in with the Council's community plan and looks to enhance biodiversity in urban areas and create a more welcoming environment for residents and visitors across the district. It is hoped the scheme will have a positive impact on people's health and wellbeing.

Before proceeding with a full scale roll out of green gateways the pilot scheme was tested in the parishes of Bilsthorpe, Blidworth and Boughton, these areas were chosen as they have a range of housing type, both new and old.

A significant portion of gateway land is owned by Notts County Council and maintained by Via East Midlands. In some cases the gateway sites are owned by Parish Councils.

Land owned by NCC means that permission has to be sought before planting can go ahead, likewise permission from Parishes also needs to be obtained.

It is important that an agreement is reached on a maintenance plan going forward.

Professional visualisation sketches will be produced to facilitate a good end result.

The sketches will also assist Town/Parish Councils to have input with a clearer understanding of the desired outcome.

Via requires that planting areas must be within a 30mph speed limit for safety reasons. Planting of a mix of wildflowers and bulbs to provide all round colour, are preferred to tree planting on grass verges. An initial maintenance programme would be supplied and agreed to ensure the new planting thrives. NSDC are currently seeking a further five Town or Parish,s for inclusion in the first tranch of works. Site installations will be free of charge, labour costs will be absorbed by NSDC, however, Town/Parish,s will be asked to cover the cost of wildflower bulbs and contribute towards a share of equipment hire.

Continuing with the green theme, from late November through to the end of March 2026. Volunteers will have the opportunity to take part in planting trees across the Newark and Sherwood area. This initiative is part of the Trees for Climate scheme in Nottinghamshire, delivered in partnership with Greenwood Community Forest. All volunteers will be matched with a suitable project. Tools and training are provided.
